Erma Johnson Blosser

Are-printed from the Concordian Newsletter

Winters in northern North Dakota are arctic, long and dangerous. Thirteen year old Erma, who grew up on a farm fifteen miles away from the nearest town, Bottineau, population 2,000, roomed there in order to go to high school. The winter weather shut in; no one could go anywhere for six snow bound weeks. She couldn't even talk to her parents. They had no phone. She was away from home for the first time and she was terribly homesick; so when a farming neighbor finally made it to town he offered her a ride on his horse drawn sleigh which was filled with straw. She told her landlady she was going home for the weekend and the women gave her an extra coat to wear. She and the farmer's daughter nestled down in the hay. It took hours in 33 degree below zero weather, and it was dark by the time they reached a cross road.

The next event is hard for us to believe, living as we do with so many comforting amenities, but as he was traveling one way and she another, the farmer allowed Erma to jump out and walk the last two miles by herself!

She almost didn't make it home. She was so cold and tired she just wanted to lie down and go to sleep, but at least she saw the light from the windows of her house, and when she appeared at the door, her appalled parents were speechless. But they knew what to do. They dunked her frozen hands and feet in the snow so that they would thaw out slowly. They didn't realize her legs were frozen too, so she suffered the after effects for quite a long time.

Let's skip up about 15 years and we will find Erma and her family in an extremely different change of climate at Plaster City, CA about two miles from the Mexican border with heat up to 110 degrees. It was so hot she would keep her children indoors in the afternoons. Ivan, her husband, was the chemist at the gypsum plant where Mexicans crossed the border to work in the mines. The Blossers were among the half dozen couples invited by the workers to share a roast pig dinner with them at their homes.

Erma met Ivan Blosser in Grants Pass, OR in 1942 where she was a registered nurse and he a chemical engineer for Rustless Iron and Steel, headquartered in Baltimore, MD. After a simple wartime marriage, they went to their first home in northern CA but they soon moved to Baltimore where Ivan decided he would join the Navy rather than be drafted. Their first child, Bob, was born in Baltimore. Then the family followed Ivan first to Florida, then to Virginia.

When the war ended, they decided they didn't want to live on either coast, so Ivan went to work for U.S. Gypsum (a plaster plant) and they moved to Sweetwater, TX where child number two, Kay, was born, and it was from there they were transferred to CA where both Bill (#3) and Linda (#4) were born. They weren't happy living in a company town, therefore Ivan transferred to Indiana where they built a home.

When they got into their new home the first thing Erma did was buy a washer and dryer as Carol became the fifth Blosser. In December 1955, while Erma was pregnant with their last child, David, the family moved to Grand Rapids, MI.

A big promotion prompted their move to Watonga, OK where a large gypsum operation was located nearby. They built their own five bedroom house there. Erma liked living there more than any other place, but they were in for one more move. It was to Wheeling, IL. And they spent their last fifteen working years there. No more bouncing around the country with little ones — in fact by the end of their stint there were no more diapers, no more scabbed knees, no more earthshaking decisions — in fact, darn it — no more kids!
